

Hello everyone,

I believe that the consideration given to volunteer workers by PMP has declined over the years and I hope to reverse this trend by voicing the comments and feelings of our members in a letter sent to the event organizer, Colin Fraser this week.

The move to contact Colin with these concerns was a Board decision made on behalf of the membership to ensure that the PMP organization understands that CRCA expects its members and guest marshals to be valued for their expertise and the quality of service they provide, and are not willing to accept less.

The other issue I wanted to mention is that regardless of how long you've been marshalling, it's always a good idea at the start of the season to review procedures in your mind in the event that something happens in your station; what your radio call should sound like, what you should be asking for and what information will need to be passed on to control in order to get the response you are looking for. A whole winter has passed since the last time you had to think about these things and the cobwebs need to be cleared before you actually have to make a call. I'd also recommend spending a few minutes reviewing your manuals if you have them, to refresh your memory on the use of flags for bikes vs cars, radio protocol, tracking, net silence, etc. (If you don't have a manual and would like one, we'll be happy to provide it.) You'll benefit from the time and so will the competitors.

Looking forward to an exciting season, packed with action and a ton of fun—and hope to see all of you there to enjoy it!

COMMUNITY ADVERTISING



Potential Star Racers, divided into rival groups, will move into spectacular Mt. Tremblant chalets to attend the world famous Jim Russell Driving School on the legendary Le Circuit racecourse.

Star Racer will combine the complex science of racing, the precise design of racecars and engines plus the evolving social dynamic of the competitors as they race to the finish line.

speed alone won't win the *Star Racer* crown. Throughout the quest, competitors will be held up to intense scrutiny by a special three-person jury comprised of established experts from the motor sports world. This jury will evaluate the drivers based on all aspects of championship racing. The decision of the jury will help determine which racers are worthy of remaining in the chase and which racers fail to make the starting grid. At the finale, one racer – the Star Racer – will capture the checkered flag and drive away with a future in big time racing on the professional circuit.

"Star Racer is a perfect fit for Discovery. It will have everything our viewers expect from us: a blend of high-octane stakes, great characters and compelling story lines all rooted in cutting edge science," said Ann Harbron, Director of Commissioning and Production for Discovery Channel Canada. PROVINCE BLOCKS ROAD AND CANCELS THE FESTIVAL OF SPEED

Sydney, NS, May 4, 2006

After 12 months of planning and organization with the knowledge and tentative support of the provincial department of tourism as a signature event, the Cape Breton TT Festival of Speed has been cancelled with official news from the Provincial government that the government will not permit the event to happen on the 53 km course.

According to the chair of the Cape Breton Festival of Speed Association, "The official word delivered by the province came as a devastating blow and without notice after almost a year of work and official filings for sanctioning and insurance were completed".

She said, "The province has been well aware of the event and designated it as a Signature Event with no indication that they had fundamental issues beyond the understandable need to pass the public safety requirements which were being organized by a professional technical team and race director. It appears that the process of proper and formal evaluation and communications were flawed within the departments."

Carroll stated, "The cancellation news is regrettable and disappointing for all of the volunteer members of the community who have acted in good faith and invested in the development of an event which promised to deliver significant economic return for the region."

The Cape Breton Festival of Speed was initiated by the Membertou Development Corporation. Under the leadership of Bernd Christmas, Membertou brought forward the opportunity for an international event which offered benefits for the entire Island and province. The Cape Breton Festival of Speed Association was created to operate and manage what had the potential to be a major annual event.

To date there have been 5000 room-nights booked 6 months ahead of the event just on the prospect and rumor it would

occur. These advance bookings alone represent a welcome addition to many tourism operators across the Island during what is a slower period in the early fall. The economic impact has been forecast to reach \$15 million dollars. The event had the support of the municipality and federal government and the economic development agencies on Cape Breton Island along with enthusiastic participation of community groups and organizations that are essential for the staging of an international event.

The TT Race is an international spectacle attracting audiences and visitor interest across North America and Europe including all of the key strategic markets for the Nova Scotia and Canadian Tourism industry. National and international media have been following the planning for the race and many have committed resources to visit Cape Breton Island to cover both the race and the destination.

Carroll said, "As a community based volunteer organization, we are very disappointed to have to cancel the event. The abrupt decision is being forced by the Provincial government in what can only be described as a very heavy-handed manner. She ended, "The province allowed the time, effort, expectations and investment of the community to continue to build for the best part of an entire year without a formal response from all departments until now." Community meetings planned for May 6 and 7 along the race course have been cancelled.

SPEAKING OF CANCELLED...
FERRARI: ROSSI FOUND A NEW CHALLENGE

Ferrari technical director Ross Brawn believes that Valentino Rossi's nightmare start to the 2006 MotoGP season was the main reason for the Italian's decision to remain on two wheels next season.

Ferrari had made a big effort to make Rossi's F1 transition a genuine possibility for 2007 and, while it could potentially still happen in the future, that now looks unlikely.



"The longer you leave it makes it a little more difficult," Brawn explained, "I guess he could reconsider in a couple of years.

"We worked with him and were very impressed with what he was able to do. Both sides had to decide if we wanted to go forward with it. He felt he had his hands full with his motorcycle career. I think the difficulties he's having this year have focused him more on that.

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A BRIEF HISTORY

The Canadian Race Communications Association (CRCA) is Canada's first and most experienced race marshalling club. It has played a significant role in the Ontario racing commu-



nity since 1959, joining the Canadian Automobile Sport Clubs (CASC) in 1960, and acquiring its Federal Charter in 1962. Based at Shannonville Motorsport Park, the Club supports the racing environment by providing Corner Marshals for all forms of racing events including regional open and closed-wheel cars, R.A.C.E. Series motorcycles, go-karts and numerous special interest groups.

CRCA Marshals have participated at racing events at Mosport Park from opening day to the present. Our members worked at events at Green Acres (near Goderich, ON) and Harewood Acres (south of Hamilton, ON) until their closing.

Our club organized the Corner Marshals for the first ever Canadian Grand Prix at Mosport International Raceway (formerly Mosport Park) in 1967, and also in 1967, were responsible for providing Marshals for the Motorcycle Grand Prix of Canada, notably the only time this country has had an FIM-sanctioned Grand Prix! CRCA has been involved in the Toronto Molson Indy from its inaugural event, and continues to participate each year.
